

Port Arthur, Tasmania 20th – 22nd March 2019 "Lavender - Past, Present and Future".





We have three new books in the library. Although they have been around for some time the information they contain is still relevant. You can borrow these books on the Library page of the website.

Making Herbal Dream Pillows by Jim Long (1998)

In this book Jim Long shares 17 recipes for dreams made to order. You'll learn the special characteristics of the herbs and flowers most effective in aromatherapy, as well as how to grow and dry them. Using step-by-step instructions you can create personal dream pillows filled with herb mixtures specially designed to conjure desired dreams.

Secrets of Plant Propagation by Lewis Hill (1985)

A comprehensive guide to a range of propagation methods. This book will be useful to the home gardener or someone planning to start a nursery . Full of practical ideas and tips for successful growing.

So You Want to Start a Nursery by Tony Avent (2003)

Tony Avent focuses on the business and planning concerns of a prospective owner – from considering whether to consult a lawyer about a partnership to whether to build your own glasshouses. While recounting humorous stories of his baptism by fire as a beginning nurseryman, Avent also provides basic information on the nursery industry as a whole, with discussions on the merits and disadvantages of retail, wholesale, mail order and liner operations, to name just a few. Readers of this book will obtain the tools they need to make a business plan of their own.

Spring at Leafy Hollow, Waiuku

Our busy season began in September with a couple of group visits coming through the garden each week. Although needs differ we usually provide a garden tour, talk on distillation and complimentary morning tea. They come mainly from the Auckland area ranging from Probus Groups, Garden Clubs, Retirement Villages, Care Homes and educational groups.

Roger's Story

For many years I worked away in my shed and later basement garages to complete an aircraft. The design I had chosen was German and the original date of its introduction 1941.

While some 30000 of these were built at the time none were flying. With a company in the US drafting plans for the aircraft, but for one scaled down in size, the 1450 horsepower engine size could be much reduced and the build price dramatically so.

By the time this was completed in 1993 folk around the world were taking a renewed interest in aircraft of World War Two and plans were afoot to have real versions rebuilt and replicas constructed. The detailing of the aircraft with all cockpit placarding signage and National markings followed considerable study. With the assistance of a German-speaking friend who at the time was a senior air traffic controller at Zurich and Dulux, we replicated paint colours from original paint chips. The aircraft was brought to as close as possible a reduced size version of the real thing. The result of the finish and detailing was the receipt of awards for type of construction, best War Replica NZ and Reserve Grand Champion NZ.



A move to Hamilton brought a review of interests and the aircraft was sold. What now? Well, it turned-out to be a place in the country. I mused on an English Cottage, I had done with the German thing so it just had to be French.

The house was designed around French aspects while the grounds, originally devoid of anything but grass, was planted out in trees of Europe, Poplars, Oaks, Ash, Elm while, with a view to the view, the oval front lawn was planted in rows of Pacific Blue. Later Avice Hill were added but the wet and damp soon paid their demise so Pacific Blue it is.

When asked why the lavender I explained it was part of the heart. What are you going to do with it? "Grow it and mow it" was the simple reply. My interest was turning toward mechanisation, moulding, laying film, planting, irrigation, harvesting and distilling. After all, I had 40

acres spare at that time and the contemplation of those interesting machines that did this and that runs powerful!

Times change and there became pressure on time so the crop and I grew older. The process of laying a new crop is underway along with a new shed, restored tractors, renovating, developing and lots of mowing. The rebuilding of the children's play set is all part of the mix, we are a generation further forward now so it has seen active service. Mike is keen for a boiler, I need one too and the intention and design are there but the realisation not quite (yet). Being an engineer and knowing full well that what can go wrong will, I imported a book of "Great Boiler Explosions of the World". From this I hold a very real picture of what not to do! Ours will be a grand boiler!

So on we go, always busy but with spare time rigidly limited to weekends things are always in a rush. To the question of when will it all be finished, the answer is never....and that is the beauty of it. Regards Roger





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
