

# Chairman's Chatter





To research, develop AND promote lavender essential oil and associated products of the highest quality

### **Report from the Chair**

Well we are now past the shortest day and many of us are still experiencing warmer than usual weather. I guess most of us are all in rest mode, catching up on maintenance or better still overseas seeking the sun.

#### **Natural Health and Supplements bill**

Since the last link I have been closely following the developments of the Natural Health and Supplements bill. The third reading of the bill was supposed to have happened and passed into law many weeks ago but at the time of

writing this has not happened. Also the submissions made were supposed to be listed on the Ministry of Health website but this also has not happened. Once enacted the regulatory scheme will be phased in over three years.

The bill will mean that all products it covers will need to be registered with the Natural Health and Supplementary Products Authority unless an exemption is granted. Our submission augured that the products that we mostly involved with are not medicines or taken internally so therefore should be exempted. We have yet to hear if this position is accepted. This bill had its genesis and first reading in September 2011. NZLGA first made submissions to this bill in Feb 2012 and the bill was subsequently amended to a more producer friendly version although this is debatable as the core requirements of white listing all ingredients instead of the more cost effective way of black listing all band ingredients are still there. The bill had its second reading in March 2013. We again made submissions in Feb 2016 and so we wait in the dark for the political wheels to turn.

#### Website developments.

With the basic website now looking stable we are now embarking on the next stage to expand the user database with a number of selectable categories that describe your business. The categories selected will then be displayed in you profile and on your trail map business card. These categories will also link to the "for sale" section so anyone visiting the website will see what services our members offer. The object is to give every member, who chooses to, a more visible profile. We are also starting to record where our website enquires come from, be it from web searches or advertising etc. so we can start measuring the effectiveness of the website and advertising. So far we have had a noticeable increase in website enquires with this new website. Many enquires have been about starting new Lavender farms, business opportunities and Lavender plants. As always I welcome your suggestions and input.

#### Conference 2016.

The south Island conference team chaired by Russell have put considerable effort into making this conference a must attend for all members and with a special focus for new members. Conferences are always a great opportunity for networking or just simply having a good time with old friends. I trust many of you will make the effort to attend and help contribute to its success. I especially look forward to the opportunity of meeting you all.

#### The future.

With the association reaching a milestone of 20 years I think it is a time to reflect on the associations success in its main goal of improving the quality of oil produced in NZ and ask the question, where to from here? We have mostly achieved our primary goal though our annual oil awards program and with a noticeable increase in the number of awards achieved. We are also now attracting many international entries so we are starting to be recognised worldwide. With many of our farms producing quality oil I believe it is time for the association to look towards the NZ market and research our NZ manufactures who use lavender oil in their products. Much of this oil I believe is imported.

There should be opportunities for our members if we can learn and define the characteristics of the oil required. I believe we also need to be more active in promoting Lavender oil through our websites and other media, specifically targeting manufactures. We need to look towards educating our NZ market for the opportunities to open.

#### Your Executive.

For the association to remain relevant to our members I would encourage any member who has an interest in the running of the association to put their name forward for election to the Executive. For too long now we have relied on a hard core of members who have now served on the Executive for a long time. New blood brings new ideas and new energy to the association. It is vital that members new or old step forward and help lead this great organisation.

Peter gave a report from the Chair re our submissions to the government.


Update on web site



### A South Island Trip for Great Barrier Lavender

For many years now we have had our Lavender Still Boiler stored at my work's warehouse in Christchurch gathering dust in a long forgotten corner. That is till our new warehouse manager found it and wanted it moved. This was just the galvanisation needed plus Margaret's insistence that we should be distilling our own oil this coming Christmas.

Moving it north to its final destination on Great Barrier Island did present some logistical challenges, not least the weight of the Boiler, 750Kg and a 6 meter length of chimney.

After looking at many options, Mike Alspach very generously offered his Ute for the job. After considering this we thought it was a great idea for a week's holiday and a chance to visit long lost friends along the way and so started our adventure. After swapping vehicles with Mike we left Te Awamutu at the leisurely time of 9am for an 8hr trip to Wellington.

We spent a Day in Wellington visiting Cindy then the morning boat to Picton and on to the Waira Valley to stay with friends we have not seen for many years. While there we visited Elsie Hall who just happened to live next door. We had an interesting tour of her lavender farm and shop.

The next morning it was on to Christchurch to pick up the Boiler. It was a bit of a shock when the boiler was loaded as to just how far the Ute sank down on its springs. A quick check of the Utes manual relieved our doubts but did suggest we put more air into the tires. With this done we gingerly drove away back up to Amberley and a night with Eleanor and Patrick. Eleanor had invited Charlotte and Keith for dinner and we had a great evening discussing many topics and of course Lavender things.

In the morning a beautiful sunny day dawned and we had a great drive up the coast stopping at the Seal Colony for a cup of tea. While there we took a walk up the track to the nursery pool where many of the young pups spend the day while their parents are out getting food for them.

By now we were well used to the extra weight on the Ute and headed once again North to Kiakoura and a quick visit to Myra McClelland Lavendyl Farm who had recently taken it over from Corry Zeestraten. Back to the Waira Valley for the night and then onto Picton and across the strait on a perfectly calm day.

The trip north was uneventful with a stop at Tokaanu for a rest at the hot pools then onto Auckland. Back in Auckland and when trying to reposition the boiler on Ute for the trip to the Barrier we discovered it was full of water. I have no idea how much water it takes but it took a long time to drain. With the Ute now a bit light it was a good opportunity to load other equipment and building stuff on.

Now fully loaded we headed for the ferry for the 4 ½ hour trip. Fortunately it was a calm sailing and after a 30 minute drive we made it to the house. The boiler being too heavy, even without the water, for the digger to lift, I had to make a frame over the Ute tray to lift the boiler up with two chain blocks, drive the Ute away, then lower it to the ground still on its transportation pallet. To make it easier to move the Boiler into position I had fitted caster wheels to the Pallet. Now all I had to do is to remove the Pallet, fit the chimney, wire up the float switches and water pump but all this is for another day.

After a short break on the Barrier, mowing, weeding, chopping wood and more work on the house it was back to the big smoke and down to Te Awamutu to return the Ute, now with a few more kms on the clock but with new wind-screen wipers. Many thanks to Mike and Marian for the loan of the Ute.

Our beautiful valley, [Wairau] in Marlborough experienced very late severe frosts which wiped out the crops.

We then went to 30 + degree days for many weeks.

A small but surprising book. There is an interesting section full of facts and anecdotes about the history of lavender and an informative section about the composition of lavender essential oil.

The section on health benefits (21 cited) is fairly impressive but comes with a page full of disclaimers.

There are a number of original recipes and concoctions using lavender as an essential ingredient. The Homemade Lavender Scented Playdough was well received by my grandchildren.

An unusual chapter on Making Your Own Lavender Essential Oil in which the author claims that "Essential oil is fairly easy to make yourself at home", using alcohol, pestle and mortar, mason jars and coffee filters, will raise many eyebrows from commercial growers!

The following three books are written by Sally Hornsey who runs "Plush Folly", a private cosmetic training company in the UK.
