Chairperson Report Feb 2020

Well it has certainly been a dry summer except for the Deep South which had all the rain we should have had in a few days. This unfortunately has meant our south Island travels had to change as we were planning to spend 5 days tramping across the Routeburn and Green Stone tracks. Now we are just going to Nelson and will do some tramping in the Mt Arthur range.

The dry weather however has been good for lavender with reports that the oil yields have been very good. Let's hope the quality is up there. I would encourage everyone who has had oil distilled to enter in our annual oil competition. It will be very interesting to see how the oils match up or exceed previous years.

Good progress is been made on redeveloping our new website. It will be a significant step up from our existing site with a much improved Lavender trail to better advertise your business and services. You will also be able to directly edit your profile along with a picture gallery. There are many other improvements so keep a watch on this space.

Planning for our Nelson Lavender conference is well underway with a line-up of some very interesting speakers and topics that I am sure will be of interest to all members. See later in this link the conference flyer. Make sure you keep the dates August 28th to 30th free.

As of writing our GC is nearly up and running and perhaps by the time you are reading this we would have run our first batch of samples. The GC has been setup in a Lab owned by Hebe Botanicals in Otaki. There will be a place on our website where you will be able to enter the details on an analysis form along with online payment. Pricing has not yet been worked out but will be very favourable for members. The GC will also allow us to further research the benefits of lavender oil and to increase its profile in NZ which is expected to benefit our members.

Along with the GC we are working to develop a template or model food control plan under section 40 of the Food Act which will allow members who produce or sell culinary lavender either as flowers or oil to comply with the food safety regulations. The GC will be part of this plan. It will be able to verify that the oil sold as culinary lavender is safe to use in foods which includes our favourite lavender ice cream and chocolate.

At this coming Nelson conference and AGM it is my intention to step down as chairperson. The role has been very rewarding and I hope the programs I have instigated have and will continue to benefit our members. I have been Chairperson for the past 6 years and feel it is time for another person to take the lead, to introduce new ideas and to further energise our association.

For the next few months I expect your will all be busy catching up on farm maintenance, preparing the still for its winter hibernation and a lot of punning of the lavender. Come August I hope you will be well rested and hanging out for our Lavender conference. I look forward to meeting you all in Nelson.

The Lavendell Story



My work with lavender was a dream from God that took me by surprise about five years ago. As I look back over those years I am very grateful that what started out very small and rather tentative has become a major part of my life. When I first had the idea of starting a lavender business, we had no land and very little likelihood of getting any. I ran my 'dream' past Pauline Livesey at Leafy Hollow, who graciously educated me on all things lavender; she encouraged me even though I was in the same district. She said, "If you're not afraid of hard work, go for it!" I wasn't, and I did!

Five years later we have a one-and-a-half-acre property outside Katikati in the beautiful Bay of Plenty, with roughly 350 lavender bushes. We grow Grosso, Pacific Blue and Impress Purple along with some others in the garden. These were supplied by Leafy Hollow. The bushes are thriving and were the only plants in our garden that were unconcerned about the long, hot, dry summer – they loved it!

We bought a still last year and were busy for most of the summer distilling oil from both the Grosso and the Pacific Blue and we had a very good yield. I make various products using our own oil and rubbed lavender and these include soap, wheat/rice bags, eye pads, eye masks, sachets, and carpet refresh amongst others.

I also sell lavender-themed gift and greeting cards from my own paintings. I have so much more to learn that I still feel very much a novice, but I appreciate the resources available to help me grow in knowledge. I would like to say that, without my husband Pieter's support and hard work, despite working a full-time job as an engineer in Tauranga, we would not be where we are today. I am also very grateful to the Lord who has made it all possible. There is still much we would like to achieve, so the Lavendell dream goes on.

National Collection of Lavender and Lavender Research



The Bendigo Botanic Gardens are situated at White Hills, on the Northern side of Bendigo. These gardens are one of Victoria's earliest with the site earmarked on the 1854 plan of the township, only 3 years after gold was discovered. The Botanic Gardens house many collections and in 2018, a Garden for the Future was opened. There are grand shade trees and large lawn areas, an aviary and water features. The National Collection of Lavenders was moved here from Yuulong Lavender Estate, Mt Egerton, where it had been under the care of Rosemary Holmes and Edythe Anderson. Our guide for the walking tour will be Kirstie Paterson who took over from Brad Crème in 2016.
