Cuttings from McLaren Vale Lavender

Do you realise the winter solstice is now behind us? From now on daylight will become a teezy bit longer each day with the possibility of more sunlight to carry us through a chilly winter. Should you be working in the Davis research station in Antarctica you could take part in the Aussie tradition of swimming in water cut through a hole in the thick ice to celebrate the Solstice. That's if you're brave or stupid.

For a while there things were getting desperate down our way. No rain from December last year until the end of May depleted all the ancillary tanks, and just an inch or two in the house tank left before a sprinkle of rain arrived to wash the dust off the place. Now in late June we are finally getting some showers, just a few and very light at that, but enough to stave off a call to the local water carter.

Leaving these cares behind us, T and I headed off on a long-planned trip to Europe. You would think visiting France, Spain, Italy, Sicily and Greece we would have come across some lavender farms. We were certainly on the lookout for them, however, they remained elusive. In truth we didn't spend enough time to research and track them down beforehand, most being located in the countryside away from the tourist spots. We did manage a visit to Grasse, [billed as the City of flowers and perfumes] where we undertook a perfume making session. An enjoyable experience, although we were left slightly underwhelmed by the town itself. I guess when you conjure up images of a place you long to visit it may not always measure up.

Surprisingly, it was a visit to Ciutat Vella an ancient inner walled city in Barcelona, Spain, that threw up an unlikely lavender connection. And for me, a follower of historic lavender ladies, I can now add another name, Katherine of Aragon [1485-1536] the first wife of King Henry V111. Within the walled city, directly below the apartment said to be the childhood home of Katherine, was a rampart used as a little lavender shop. What an unlikely surprise to delve into this ancient stone cavity and talk lavender in sign language and smiles. The owner having a small lavender farm 40 kms out of Barcelona. I've learnt that Katherine herself was an exceptionally talented woman who grew lavender in her herbal garden and used lavender water and fresh flowers throughout her home to freshen her chambers and linen. Amongst other products, I bought some essential oil





[angustifolia] as a keepsake. It is the most exquisitely scented oil, somehow sweeter and deeper in fragrance to my own. A little anecdote...

"Katherine was a talented embroiderer and continued to make shirts for her husband during his divorce proceedings against her." Now that's devotion for you.

Back home the rain has bought up the weeds and the rows of dentata have started to bloom to take us through to Spring.

Southern New South Wales Report - by Wendy Fuller (ALR - South NSW)

THE MONARO COUNTRY LAVENDER COOP.

This group is going from strength to strength. The Field Day held at Bombala earlier this year sparked much interest and local workshops have been well attended. The energetic activities and exposure resulted in several new group members. Their ideas about the end uses of lavender production are varied and will no doubt be complementary to the group as a whole.

Eric and Sherida Edgecombe from "Semperfields" at Bibbenluke, have about 2500 plants now in their patch. (Grosso, Bee and Egerton Blue) and hope to plant 500 more in Spring. They are excited about their early distillations and with one large and one small still will keenly pursue this craft. Tourist options are being explored and they are planning to attend the New Zealand Conference.

ORKNEY PARK | Michael & Suzanne Hill

Of the original 3000 Grosso planted in late 2022, about half have survived drought and weeds. Michael observed that, of the survivors, some bushes were growing strongly while many others were struggling. Soil testing revealed that nutrition was the main factor. Large quantities of fertiliser etc would be needed to correct the soil balance: not on Michael's agenda. Researching other plant possibilities for his sandy soil, Michael is trialling Proteas and the "Pink Ice" variety is doing very well. So: Watch this space.....maybe proteas with a touch of lavender!

near Braidwood | Pascal Jallier

Too much rain! A Rain Bomb as Pascal put it, in mid June, 134 mls in 20 hours! Swiftly running water caused erosion which seriously compromised some of the irrigation equipment.

However, their 11,000 plants (all Angustifolias: Bee, Pacific Blue and Maillet)mostly survived. Pascal is very pleased with both the oil and hydrosol from their distillations.

Blue Mountains Lavender Farm | Louise & Bruce

Winter has been a challenging time for Louise and Bruce Bickerton. Louise fell and severely damaged her femur and knee. Happily, she is making a steady recovery.

Work on the lavender scene has been slower, but Bruce has learned a few new recipes and he continues with his interest in distillation.

They planned to landscape the front of the property and this is underway. Riverina Allan will be intensively planted to make an eye catching panorama for visitors to wander through and enjoy photo opportunities.

THE BIRRAMIL ESTATE (a bit south of Mudgee) | Nicholas Esdaile Watts & Jonathon Strauss

Nick and Jonathon enjoyed the Field Day in Victoria and returned home with 2000 plants covering 20 varieties. Their existing major planting of Grosso will now have some different friends.

The local wombats and kangaroos have no respect for any of the plantings. A definite challenge! Some successful propagation has been done from the original Grosso.

Some stems missed during the mechanical harvest in summer were snipped off, put in water, sat on a sunny windowsill and developed little roots within a couple of weeks. They are now being tenderly cared for in the poly tunnel.

A wombat (we'll call him "Bulldozer") recently knocked over a beehive near the house. Nick and Jonathon were just about to go to work, but then had to spend some frantic time getting bees back home and settled. Never a dull moment!
