1.5 Sheep get the Lavender Blues

A flock of merino sheep at UWA's research farm at Wundowie are helping scientists understand more about a condition that affects millions of people around the world every year. Dr Penny Hawken, from the School of Animal Biology, has recently co-authored a paper in *Physiology and Behaviour*, in which she suggests that handing out benzodiazepines – commonly used to treat anxiety (which often leads to depression) – may not be beneficial for everyone. Interested in the increasing use of alternative therapies to treat medical conditions in humans, Dr Hawken studied the effects of lavender oil on a group of anxious sheep and on a group of calm sheep.

Lavender oil and other essential oils do have a direct effect on the brain and with more research they could be used as alternative treatments to conventional drugs, she said. To find out how sheep reacted to lavender, she and her colleagues devised a study where findings suggest that "The lavender oil made the calm sheep even calmer but made the nervous sheep even more nervous," she said.



Cuttings from McLaren Vale Lavender

Fortunately, we've had some good rains and apart from the rivulets flowing down the track, carving out deep ruts, the plants and trees look refreshed, and the tanks are well on their way to being full again. T and I have been laying trailer loads of quarry gravel around the house, and Peter will have to come in with his backhoe to sort out the track. The wood pile near the bottom gate is getting bigger and bigger and will have to wait for some drier weather before I can get a bonfire going to clear it.

Taking advantage of the rain I've been busy planting some new varieties of rosemary and lavender to replace old plants. Quite an arduous job, taking the wheelbarrow down the hill loaded with pots and compost, then working my way along the contour of the hill, ankle deep in wet soursobs. The row took a lot longer to complete having to dodge the showers, and by about 3 o'clock I called it a day and trudged back up the track. No sooner had I climbed to the top, the sun came out and I flopped down on the lookout bench, put my face to the sun and took in the welcome warm rays. The pleasure is all the greater when it is unexpected and out of season. Just like coming across a solitary rose in full

bloom on a bare bush about to be pruned, dazzling in colour, fragrant and sparkling with rain drops in the winter sun.



The northern hemisphere summer is in full swing, and I recently received a welcome email from friends visiting London on holiday, a trip they had planned to take 3 years ago. As things turned out they were in exactly the right place at the right time to enjoy the festivities

surrounding The Queens Platinum Jubilee. They

sent me images of 'Superbloom' at the Tower of London, my eyes were agog. Picture 20 million seeds of wildflowers sown in the moat surrounding the tower; designed to bloom right through summer, creating a beautiful naturalistic landscape, pollinators, colour and all those good things that nature can provide for our wellbeing. [Note; the lavender in full bloom to replicate the colour of the moat water]. The landscape will remain in the moat as a permanent Jubilee Legacy.

ABOUT DR UWE STROEHER

Dr Uwe Stroeher graduated with a Ph.D in Microbiology from the University of Adelaide where he remained for a further six years working as a research scientist. In 1988, he was awarded the prestigious Alexander von Humboldt Research Fellowship and subsequently spent over two years working in Germany.

On his return to the University of Adelaide, he worked on Stretococcus pneumoniae before moving to the Hepatitis Research Laboratory. A move to Flinders University marked the beginning of his work on the super bug Acinetobacter baumannii and also the use of clean technology to enhance chemical compounds.

During his research career Dr Stroeher published over 40 peer reviewed journal articles.

Over the last 25 years, Dr Stroeher has had a keen interest in soil microbiology and in bioremediation, which led to an immediate interest in consulting to Neutrog on the development of GOGO Juice in 2005. This consultancy extended for the development of Litterbugs (to be marketed and sold as LITTERM8) an ammonia liberating biological for use in commercial animal bedding and potential application in cat litter.

In 2016, Dr Stroeher joined Neutrog full to head up the R&D program.
